

ECCT Facilities Principles Checklist: 3. Partnerships

Facility Lifecycle Stage:
Concept & Plan

Objective: To ensure the **right relationships** are in place **to build/operate the facility**. The project should be underpinned by cohesive and constructive stakeholder partnerships that have a proactive emphasis for maximum resource use and maximum community benefit. This will ultimately enhance the efficiency and sustainability of the facility. Partnerships include community engagement and input into the project development stage.

<p>Process Considerations: In the capital works phase, it will be important to show evidence of user/community support and engagement processes (if applicable). Agreements between partners will also need to be provided (e.g. MOUs, leases, or similar - if applicable). Connection and/or community development projects will need a higher level of user or community engagement.</p>	

¹ The IAP2 spectrum groups participation into five categories: Inform, consult, involve, collaborate, empower (in order of least-to-most participation). Each level is legitimate, depending on the goals, timeframes, resources, and levels of concern in the decision to be made.
